A Gift for Every Child

Parents/carers of 205 nursery, primary school and high school children living in Brora received a voucher in December/January to spend in KeyStore Express, Brora as part of Brora Development Trust's effort to support households with children in light of the high cost of living.

A voucher, worth £20, has been given to parents/ carers for each child of nursery age and above. The vouchers were also offered for children who are home schooled.

Parents/carers had the opportunity to opt out of receiving the one off voucher, which can be redeemed against goods, apart from alcohol, cigarettes and scratch/lottery tickets. The vouchers were distributed through Brora Primary and Golspie High School.

The vouchers were funded by Westminster Foundation as part of it's emergency relief fund for Sutherland and administered by Brora Development Trust, in response to an increasing number of people being affected by the sharp rise in cost of living.

Chair of Brora Development Trust, Tony Gill, said "although the vouchers aren't a long term solution to the high cost of living, they may provide some financial relief to households with children at this time".

Brora Development Trust would like to thank KeyStore Brora, Brora Primary School and Golspie High School for all their help and support in making this initiative possible.

The vouchers are part of Brora Development Trust's work to support children of a school age during the holiday periods when they are not at school. Meal starter kits and breakfast packs were offered to children during the summer and October school holidays last year, with funding from the Highland Council's Food Plus scheme.

Brora Development Trust also contributed funds from the Westminster Foundation to Golspie High School Parent Teacher Association to provide a free Christmas meal to pupils.

Funding to Support Brora Food Share Shed

Brora Development Trust have released £900 of funds from Anne Duchess of Westminster Fund, to Engaging with Activity, a Community Interest Company which runs Brora Village Hub, to support the operation of Brora Food Share

Shed. This funding is part of a wider package of funding secured by Brora Development Trust, to release to charities/groups operating food sheds/larders across Sutherland.


The Brora Food Share Shed has been operating for almost 4 years and relies on the hard work and dedication of a team of volunteers. The majority of stock for the Shed comes from local supermarkets in




Brora, Golspie and Tain which is collected daily by a committed team of volunteers. Some stock also comes from the charity CFine which provides food surplus and from kind donations from individuals. The Shed was set up to help reduce food waste in landfill and help fight climate change. The Shed was originally funded by Tesco and Kilbraur windfarm.

However, a survey conducted by Brora Development Trust of all food larders/share sheds in Sutherland, showed that all food share sheds/larders are experiencing a shortage of stock just at a time when local demand for household food support is increasing. The shortage is a result of less surplus food being available from supermarkets, fewer donations and increase in transport costs for collection and distribution of food. These findings have also been echoed by other charities/groups operating food sheds/larders.









The funding from Anne Duchess of Westminster Foundation will enable food sheds and larders to purchase stock and pay for operational costs for the larders. Brora Development Trust will continue to work to seek funding for food related initiatives to meet local demands.


100+ CLUB

The 100+ Club is a significant source of fundraising for Brora Development Trust and runs from April to March at a cost of just £12 a year. Otter's Couch

The Otter's Couch social enterprise continues to thrive and celebrated three years of trading early this year, attracting local customers and visitors alike. The shop is staffed by volunteers, crafters and one part-time employee. Over 40 local crafters and artists sell their produce in the shop, with local charities such as Brighter Brora, Highland Wildlife Rescue, Blue Highlands Bird Rescue, Friends of Clyne War Memorial and Brora Learning Zone supported. Fara Sutherland's book, *Don't Litter Rubbish* can also be bought in the Otter's Couch, with book sale donations going to the









charity, Education Aid, a group which fill bags and shoe boxes for the Blythswood appeal, sent as gifts to Ukraine and Eastern Europe. Brora Rangers football club also have merchandise for sale in the shop.

Brora Development Trust have also prepared project plans, which are dependent on funding, to set up a visitor information point in the Otter's Couch. The purpose of the visitor information point will be to share information with visitors about where to stay, eat, visit and what to do in the area and encourage visitors to spend more time in and around Brora. The information point will provide local businesses with promotional and marketing opportunities.

The shop is now operating winter opening hours, Tuesdays to Saturdays 10am to 4pm, closed Sundays and Mondays.


Brora Village Library have a great number of activities on offer, from fly tying, scrabble group, lego club, storytelling for young children, board games and colouring during school hours for children not in mainstream education, as well as usual library services. The library is open to everyone Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday, with times varying.


Brora Community Centre this month launch a Hot Spot initiative,

making the lounge and kitchen available to anyone who would like to use it on Tuesdays and Thursdays, 9am to 4pm, with free Wi-Fi and hot drinks and refreshments. Other activities include a sewing and crafts. The Community Centre also provide a venue for other clubs and groups, such as the Bowling Club, Toy Library and East Sutherland Live Arts and Entertainment.










Brora Village Hub run daily activities for anyone who would like to take part, from gardening to sewing, group walks, knitting, to gentle exercise sessions. The Hub is also available to anyone who would like to drop by and relax in the front lounge. Freshly prepared meals are available at lunch time too, at a reasonable cost. The Hub is open Mondays to Fridays, with organised activities take place each day apart from Fridays. The Hub also operate the Food Share Shed which is open 7 days a week,

Billiards to Burns Suppers: The Life of Brora Scout and Guide Hall


The Hall, on Gower Street, started life as a Temperance Hall and opened in 1893. It served as a meeting place for members of the temperance movement, which had spread to the United Kingdom (UK) and other countries from the United States of America (USA). There were activities such as billiards, darts and table tennis, although you needed to be at least 16 years old to enter the billiard hall. It was rumoured some local lads would go up to the village for a few pints and only then to the Temperance Hall to play billiards or table tennis and chew the fat.

After WW1 the Hall became a meeting place for WW1 veterans who called it Comrades Hall, before they eventually moved on to the Drill Hall (now Kingcraig's storage area).

In the 1940s, there were Whist Drives in the Hall which were very popular – one lifelong local still remembers helping her Granny with the teas for the Whist Drives but still always no alcohol. The Card Master was Johnny Cunningham. The area which is now the car park at the side of the Hall was a grassed area – known as the Hall park - where the Side Shows used to stop in Brora. The grass was cut by Willac MacLeod who lived just along from the Hall.

After WW2, it has to be assumed that the Hall continued as a Temperance Hall also serving as a venue for some religious services as well. Although into the early/mid 1960s it seems to have lain empty for a few years.











Brora Scout and Guide Hall, Gower Street, Brora

At one time the Hall was locked up and no-one had a key. Despite advertising in the Northern Times over several weeks, no-one with a key came forward. Subsequently, some Scouts, aided and abetted by a person of undeniable civic and social standing who shall be nameless, were able to gain access to the Hall. From there began the resurgence of the property as a facility for Scouts, Cubs, Guides and Brownies who had been using the old school and then the new school at Johnstone Place as their meeting place. Most people who remember the Hall though, talk about the three billiard tables which dominated the space. It's not certain what happened to the billiard tables (though some of you may know differently?) – suffice it to say, they are not there now!

In 1992, with the aid of grants, the Hall was renovated to improve access, toilet and kitchen facilities. A grand opening event took place with Mrs Polson, a Brora stalwart and long-time Brownie leader, doing the honours. Management of the Hall from then has been undertaken by Brora Scout and Guide Hall Group, a recognised charity, independent of the youth movements. Since then, the Hall Group has aimed to provide good and safe facilities for Scouting and Guiding, as well as use of the Hall by other local organisations and individuals.



Over the years the Hall has been kept in good order through fund-raising, local favourite The Granny's Attic Sale and the community Burns Supper, both of which have been taking place for 25 years or more. Of course, these events have been absent from the village calendar for the past three years, like so many other community activities, but the Hall Group plans to resume in 2023 with their Burns Supper, Saturday 28 January 2023.

Almost one hundred and thirty years on from opening as a Temperance Hall, the building has evolved to meet the changing needs of village life, more recently as the local centre for COVID vaccination clinics. Let's hope it will continue to be a focal point for many years to come.
